Appendix 2 : Orders of Battle

This is the official structures, actual orders of battle, unit numbers and comments taken out from the main text and collected for each unit. All comments not lifted from the text are in italics.

There was also a small amount on the Soviets, but it is of very limited value, as much better information is available elsewhere.

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Structure of a Polish Infantry Division

On 11 August the Supreme Command issued a summary of the instructions issued so far:

- The general complement of an infantry division was to be: 647 officers, 20 753 NCOs and privates, 6 439 horses. The rolling stock was: 2 419 wagons and 6 cars.
- The combat numbers were: 316 officers, 9 239 bayonets, 250 sabres, 150 heavy machine guns, 102 light machine guns, 36 light cannon, 12 heavy cannon and 24 mortars. Some divisions, such as the 8th, 11th and 1st Lit-Bel Divisions, were to have three automatic rifles in exchange for each light machine gun.

These numbers assume a full replenishment of troops, although full complement was not always reached even at the Battle of Warsaw (and rarely elsewhere in the war).

These numbers do not include the sapper company that is shown attached to each regiment overleaf. Presumably they were formally part of the division's sapper battalion, not the regiment.


The artillery was formed into *divizions*, each of three four-gun batteries. The three field gun *divizions* formed an artillery regiment, ideally with the division's number, and the heavy divizion was separate, but with the same number (so the 15th ID had the 15th Artillery Brigade, formed from the 15th FAR and the 15th HAD). In practice few divisions had anything close to that.

The cavalry attached to divisions varied massively from the ideal.

An infantry division was to have a telegraph company and a radio telegraph platoon, but it was rare to have the radio platoon. The telegraph company was officially divided into four telegraph platoons and a staff telegraph platoon, each consisting of four telegraph sections, a patrol of communication riders and two cyclists. In total the official telegraph company strength was six officers, 301 privates, 70 pack horses, 34 wagons, 1 motorbike and 12 bicycles.


The actual strength of the telegraph companies was lower than that. On 15 August the 8th Company had 8 officers and 257 men; the 10th Company had 2 officers and 167 men, the 11th Company had 5 officers and 232 men, the 15th Company had 2 officers and 270 men, and the 7th Reserve Company had 2 officers and 196 men. On 30 August the 1st Lit-Bel Company had 4 officers and 206 men.

Notes on 7th Reserve Brigade:

Formed at the beginning of 1920, mostly from Greater Poland formations with three regiments. The 167th IR had many volunteers from Upper Silesia.

This unit was withdrawn from the front in late July as a result of being warn out and radically reformed. The 155th absorbed multiple march companies. The men of the 167th IR were merged to become its 1st Battalion, the former 3/109 the 2nd Battalion, and the brigade's previous 159th IR its 3rd Battalion. That left it very varied in both origins and equipment.

It would appear the extra batteries should be in the Skrzeszew Group. They appear with them on maps and otherwise the group is a divizion, so wouldn't need to be a "group".



Notes on 8th ID

The 8th ID was formed from regiments that came into being at the end of 1918 so was one of the oldest divisions (the 21st and 36th IRs were from Warsaw, the 33rd from Łomża, and the 13th was from Kraków). It was veteran, but battered by the time of the Battle of Warsaw.

The 3rd Company of the 142nd Regiment was attached just before the battle.

The text and tables have that Battery 6/8 FAR and Battery 4/1st MAR was also with the division.

The strengths below are after a major supplementation with march battalions, which took place during 13 and 14 August.



Notes on the 10th ID

This unit could trace its origins to the 4th Polish Rifle Division of the 2nd Polish Corps in Imperial Russia, and had briefly fought alongside the Whites. Due to this it was sometimes referred to as the 10th Kaniów Rifle Division. *In practice it was usually referred to as an "infantry" division with "infantry" regiments*.

The 28th Regiment has a lot of volunteers from Łódź alongside those from Russian service. The 29th Regiment had a lot of former POW members.

It was a veteran unit, that had survived the retreat to Warsaw largely intact.

The 31st IR had been separated from the division for quite some time by the Battle of Warsaw.

Żeligowski had a reputation for leading very much from the front, and often somewhat at odds with his instructions from above.

Each of the regiments had a platoon of mounted scouts.



Notes for 11th ID:

It was originally the 2nd Polish Rifle Division of General Haller's Army. The 46th, 47th and 48th Border Rifle Regiments were originally the 4th, 5th and 6th Polish Rifle Regiments.

Original equipment was French, but the new units brought in some English and Austrian material.

It fought extensively and was withdrawn from the front in late July 1920, as a result of being worn out. Not helped by many of the veterans being de-mobbed.

It absorbed 2,000 deserters and stray soldiers in early August. Later some march, reserve and volunteer units were integrated, a couple as entire battalions. (The 47th Regiment has four battalions because of the late addition of the 1st Warsaw Guard Battalion.) This meant that the division ranged from very green to veteran in its different battalions. Many of the officers were new to the division.

Morale was not high at the start of the Battle of Warsaw, with too much retreating and too many new men insufficiently integrated.

The 2nd *Divizion* of the 4th Horse Rifle Regiment was previously the 2nd *Divizion* of the 1st Light Horse Rifle Regiment (later to become the 2nd *Divizion* of the 4th Dragoon Regiment).

The infantry had five 37-mm cannons, in poor shape, and not operational at this period.

On 1 August the 1st Battalion of the 46th Regiment was sent to General Wroczyński's group, remaining away from the division for about a month.

During the Battle of Warsaw the artillery was supplemented by that of the bridgehead sector under Colonel Szpręglewski.

A Combined half-squadron of the 1st Light Horse Regiment was attached in the battle.


Colonel Krzywobłocki had only just before taken command of the 46th BRR, and was old and ineffective. On 13 August, after the defeat, he was replaced by Major Liwacz, the previous regimental commander.

Lt-Colonel Szczepan had also taken command only just before the battle.

The 1st Battalion of the 46th BRR is given "1A" in the text and maps. I do not know why.

Notes on 15th ID:

This was first formed as the 2nd Great Poland Rifle Division.

It was experienced but in poor shape when it arrived at the Battle of Warsaw, not helped by a lack of officers. The artillery was in good condition.

On the bridgehead it was assigned a number of other units. In addition to the order of battle above there was also the 2nd Lancer Regiment squadron, Battalion 1/223, four batteries of the 201st FAR and a 100-mm battery.

Battalion 1/168 was sent to the western bank of the Vistula, along with Batteries 5/201 and 6/201 FAR.



Notes on 1st Lit-Bel Rifle Division:

This unit was also known as the 19th Infantry Division during this battle, although soon reverting to its original name.

Major Matczyński's battalion had been with the division before the retreat to Warsaw.

This was one of the older units in the Polish army and was built around a hard core of volunteers, so was very experienced. It was better on the offensive than defensive.

The officers were very experienced, and most had been with the division for some time.

The Horse Rifle *Divizion* was also built around a core of volunteers from the Lit-Bel region, and was sometimes known as the Grodno Lancers.

The light artillery was Russian 76-mm (3") guns. The heavy artillery was 105-mm. (The 2nd *Divizion* of the Lit-Bel Field Artillery was at Modlin for the duration of the Battle of Warsaw.)

The Artillery had come from General Żeligowski's division in Odessa, so was also experienced. It was well equipped, especially its horses, except the 3rd *Divizion* which had poor quality horses.
